or our rural communities. No other business has had to cut its income by nearly 60 percent in two years. That is what we are facing. However, we have faith in the tobacco price support system and the quota formula and if we hang on, the formula will work itself out for the betterment of all of us involved.

We want to retain as many growing opportunities as possible. Our goal is to maximize the farmers ability, to get the most dollars from history of the position we are in, the pool stocks have built up over time to a level that has become unhealthy as far as the operation of the program. We at the Co-op visited with the largest purchaser of our leaf (it should be noted that they were the only manu-facturer who showed interest in our situation) on January 20, 2000 and situation) on January 20, 2000 and asked for help in relieving pressure in such a major cut. They indicated that they would be willing to do a pro-gram very similar to what was done in November with flue-cured tobacco farmers. This would be the purchase of some 50 million pounds out of the

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pool stocks and leaving us with 300+ million pounds still in the pool thus, not alleviating the problem. This offer

-million pounds still in the pool thus, not alleviating the problem. This offer would cost our no-net costs funds approximately \$87.000,000 and only reduce the quota cut to \$5 percent. In examining all our options, the board on January 20, 2000, decided to standfast with the position taken earlier and not discount pool stocks price. With the cost of over \$3.9 for no-net cost funds per pound of quota added back to our opportunities for

this would be a beneficial position for the Co-op and for the farmers. In the past 20 years, every time we had for the Co-op and for the tarmers. In the past 20 years, every time we had a problem the answer has been to eat the price of U.S. tobsacco that we hold in pool stocks. The C-op made the right decisions for the time just as we are doing today. But now, the companies have become addicted, not to nicotine, but to cheap U.S. leaf prices brought about by their decisions to increase imports on a constant level. Your Burley C-oop has taken a stand to say that U.S, leaf si superior, higher in value and we as producers are willing to take what cuts are distanced in order to preserve a profitability of what has become the very lifeline to our farming families.


