Mt.Vernon passes wage, earnings tax

One half percent will be collected beginning April 1

On Monday night, the Mt. Vernon
City Council finally passed a final

reading of an ordinance which will tax the wages of the working manfor woman and the profits of the businesses operating inside the city.

The tax will be one-half percent of every dollar earned and will be paid to the city on a quarterly basis.

After nearly ten weeks of discussions and protests only two people, besides the council showed up for the final vote.

Mayor Karen King read a short summary of the ordinance and asked for a vote.

Council members Lou Vanhoose, Clark Mullins and Wayne Bullock voted in favor and Clarice Kirby and Jackie Renner voted no. Beëause former councilmember Daryl Smith resigned from the coun-cil last month after he moved out of

the city limits, only five council mem-bers have voted on the ordinance. There are two major differences in the ordinance now than there were in November when the council first passed it.

In November, the council attempted to pass and one and a half percent tax on just wage earners.

Then they decided to include the net profits of the businesses in the county as well.

At a later meeting, a committee formed by Mayor King to study the tax recommended a one percent tax instead of a one and a half percent

And when the city finally got information from the state that showed a one percent tax would gen-erate and estimated \$1.2 million annually, the council voted to lower the rate to a half percent.

On the recommendation of councilmember Clarice Kirby, the city also exempted the wages of everyone 65 or older from the tax. The ordinance also excempts the first \$2,000 of net profits on a business owned by someone 65 or older.

Mayor King said the city would begin mailing out forms to businesses as soon as possible, so that on April I, they can begin witholding the tax from employee's wages.

The tax will be paid to the city on a quarterly basis. The net profits tax will be paid to the city on an annual

basis.

Mayor King said that city clerk
Kaye Rader would be designated as
the tax administrator, but that she
would hire additional clerical help for the city to handle the extra paper work that will be required in the of

According to the ordinance, the city will have the authority to audit the books of businesses in the city to make sure they are complying with the tax.

Federal Judge denies bond for Lovells until April 17 trial date

Ten defendants in an alleged drug-running ring based in Rockcaste County are a danger to society and will be held without bail until their trials, a fideral judge ruled Tuesday. Family members sobbed and ankle chains clinked as two women and eight men hobbled out of the Lexigar-ton courtroom after U.S. Magistral James B. Todd issued his rulling. Eight of the 10 are connected by blood or marriage to the Floyd and Berniced. ovell family of Burr. They are among 16 indicted off February 3 on charges ranging from selling co-caine to transporting drug money across state lines, according to an indictment unscaled last Wednesday. re arrested last Tuesday. The 10 were arrested last Iuesauy, and federal prosecujors asked yester-day to detain them without bond until their April 17 trial.

Two others, David and Barbara Lovell, are already in jail awaiting a murder trial in Rockeastle County. A third man, Ronnie Bradley, is in fed-

eral prison. It is unclear where the other three men, all Cubans residing in Miami, are. Investigators who testified at the detention hearing said the family, led by Richard Allen Lovell, had used drug money to buy as much as \$2 million worth of occasine from connections in Florida then transported it to Kentucky for sele here. Poll says sexual activity on rise at high school

Student drug use down

A recent poll of 687 students at
R skeastle County High School
shows some very disturbing trends,
but also suggest that most students at
the school feel safe.
The survey taken last month by
students in every grade level shows
that 49 percent of the student body at
RCHS say they have had sexual intercourse.

That is up five percent from two years ago when students were given the same survey.

The survey, which is required by the Kentucky Department of Education every two years, was conducted by the Youth Services Center at the high school.

Although sexual activity by students at the school has increased in the two year period, drug use has declined, according to the survey. In 1998, 9 percent said they had used drugs and this year's survey showed that 42 percent had used drugs, down some 12 percent. 47 percent of the students surveyed said they thought drugs were a problem at the school, while 53 percent said they thought surveyed said they thought drugs were a surveyed said they thought drugs were not a problem.

Only eigh percent of those polled said they thought weapons at schools were a problem and 88 percent said they felt safe as chool.

29 percent of those polled said they did not use any type of birth control when they did nhave sex and 13 percent said they had contracted a sexually transmitted disease.

Seven percent said they had been pregnant or caused a pregnancy and 45 percent said they thought teen pregnancy was a problem at the school.

25 percent of those having sex

asid they had been with four or more partners, while 41 percent said they had been with four or more partners, while 41 percent said they had been with only one person.

62 percent of those polled said they had used alcohol.

Only 53 percent of those polled aid they thought officials at RCHS did enough in drug prevention and 58 percent said they thought that saff at RCHS was aware of the presence of drugs.

27 percent of those polled said they talked to their parents when they had a problem, while 64 percent said talked to a friend. 49 percent also said they would

feel comfortable talking to a teacher

feel comfortable talking to a teacher at school if there were a problem. Students at RCHS said drug abuse counseling and prevention programs was listed as the most important issue for students at RCHS. Number two was alcohol abuse and counseling, number three was dropout prevention programs, number four employment and vicational training and number five was health services or referral to health services.
