Conservation District Cost Share Program announced

The Rockcastle County Conservation District will be accepting requests for cost sharing funding under the Kentucky Soil Erosion and Water Quality Cost Share Program beginning February 1 and extending through February 28.

The Kentucky Soil Brosion and Water Quality Cost Share Program was created to help agricultural operations protect the soil and water resources of Kentucky. This Bill establish annual cost share funds to be administered by conservation districts with priority given to animal waste related prob-

approved by the Soil and Water Conservation Commission at the Kentucky Division of Conservation, located in Frankfort, as funds are

Division asking residents to use extreme caution

The Spring Forest Fire Hazard Season official began February 15, but in reality, except for the recent snow periods, fires have continued to occur since July of last year. The Kentucky Division of Forestry is asking citizens to be very careful when conducting any outdoor burn-

ing this spring.

Last year, over 139,100 acres of Ing this spring.

Last year, over 139,100 acres of Kentucky's forests were damaged by wildfire, making 1999 the worst forest five year in the last decade. More than 100,000 of these acres burned last fall. "We do not wann a repeat of last year. Drought conditions still exists in some areas of the state, making conditions conducive for forest fires. Many of the fires in 1999 were attributed to arson and the division is still investigating and prosecuting some of those cases. The division is committed to fully prosecuting some of those cases. vision of Forestry. KRS 149.400 prohibits burning in or within 150 feet of any woodland or brushland, except between the hours of 6 p.m. and 6a.m. This restriction is in effect from February 15 until the Spring Forest Fire Hazard Season April 30.

Spring Forest Fire Hazard Season ands on April 3s allowed between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m., no one should conduct outdoor burning unless the p.m. and and there is adequate moisture in the air and there is adequate moisture in the air and ground to prevent the spread of fire. It is illegal to start a fire anytime of the year on one art imberfand without taking all reasonable precautions include, clearing the ground around a fire and having tools and water readily available. The law also requires that all outdoor fires be attended until fully extinguished.


