pre-spawn Bass will move into shal-low water because the move low water because the water tem-perature is beginning to rise. Even though you might not catch a lot of though you might not eatch a lot of fish during this time of year the one you do catch might be that trophy Largemouth that you have always with the properties of the procession and sparse there is no doubt there are more big Biass caught during the pre-season and sparse time of year. Here are a few tup that might help. The pre-seasons Bass are not very agressive right now so as you fish with artificial lures remember to slow down your presentation. Also, remember small lakes and ponds will heat up faster than larger reservoirs. Don't think you have to fish Lake
