CRP Continuous Signup
Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman announced that landowners could receive more money for participation in the Conservation Reserve Program continuous signup. The new financial incentives, totaling up to \$350 million in the neat three years, include signing bonuses and more money for installing and maintaining conservation practices.

"Higher payments should persuade more landowners to participate, protecting over more environmentally sensitive land along streams, viers, wetdands and public water supplies," Glickman said, speaking tothe Agriculture Earth Day celebration on the National Mall. The continuous signup enhance-ments, part of the Clinton-Gore plan to strengthen the farm safety net, consist of additional economic incentives and updated rates including:
