#### Montgomery wins prosecutor's seat

Acting Commonwealth At-torney Eddy F. Montgomery was an easy winner in Tuesday's pri-mary election for Commonwealth Attorney.

mary election for Commonwealth Attorney. Montgomery defeated his op-ponent David Tapp, a former as-sistant prosecutor and Somerset attorney, 3,292 to 1,928.

In Pulaski County Montgomery defeated Tapp 2,647 to 1,502.
In Lincoln County, Montgomery won 311 to 211. In Rockeastle County, Montgomery defeated Tapp 335 to 215.
Montgomery defeated Tapp in nine of Rockeastle's 13 precincts

in nine of Rockcastles 13 pre-cincts.

Although'it didn't matter, Texas Governor George W. Bush beat Senator John McCain 467 o 31 and Vice President Al Gore defeated Bill Bradley, 126 to 17.

Democrat Michael Vacca defeated Sidney Jane Bailey 63 to 62 in Rockcastle County, but Bailey won overall in the fifth congressional district. She faces an uphill battle in the Fall when she will take on Someriset Republican Harold Rogers, who has been in Congress since 1980.

Rockcastle County Clerk Norma Houk said only 745 people voted Tuesday, or seven percent of those eligible. The fewest voted in West Livingston, where fifteen went to the polis and the most-oided in West Mt. Vernon, where 111 cast ballots. Statewide only 12 percent voted.

#### Local man found guilty Thursday

A local circuit court jury has recommended a sentence of ten years for a Sand Hill man who had been accused of kidnapping and beating his wife and 10-menth-old child in August of last year.

Benji Jones, 31, of Sand Hill was found guilty of two counts of unlawful imprésonment, two counts of menacing and one count of assault. Jones had been accused of beating his now ex-wife, Nell, with a gun and bitting his 10-month-old son with his fists list August 15.

The trial, which began last Venenchus lasted only two days. Jones will be formally sentenced on Friday.

# I-75 injury accident . . . . .



A three vehicle pile-up on 1-75 Friday afternoon sent four people to the Rockcastle Hospital. According to Kentucky State Trooper Jessie Lafe Owens, the 6 p.m. accident occurred when a truck hauling camper tops stalled in the slow lane of the northbound side. The accident was in the construction area, where both the slow lane and passing lane are enclosed by barriers, with no shoulder available. Owens said another truck, which left the sence of the accident, made a quick move from the slow lane to the fast lane, cansing a family from Ohlo to hit both walls and a Corbin man to hit the care they were driving besides the wall on the right. One of the passengers in the car from Ohlo was treated at Rockcastle and flown to the University of Kentucky Medical Center. The other three, including a man from Corbin, were all treated at the Rockcastle Hospital.
