for those cities who want to improve their downtowns.

The objectives of the Renaissance Kentucky is to utilize to the fullest extent possible the expertise and resources within state government to focus and direct state funding to selected cities. This would help our community in locating funding sources and other pertinent information for the revitalization of our downtown. In addition to state government representatives, seven other private and federal entities have appointed Renaissance Kentucky liaisons within their respective agencies and will provide technical assistance and funding resources when available.

There has never been a time when it was so important as it is today to seize every opportunity available to

help create a community where our young folks can find job opportunities and recreational centers close to home. There has never been a more opportune time for our community to rally together, as never before, to take advantage of and to expand our many assets.

The Reverend Robert I. Gannon, former President of Fordham University wrote, "All true civilization is ninety percent heirlooms and memories—an accumulation of small but precious deposits left by the countless generations that have gone before." This helps to remind us that the progress of civilization has been uneven, but every generation can add something, be it little or much, to this heritage of the past.
