been stored at the Army Depot in
Richmond since 1944.
Some of the chemical agents,
which were designed by the army to
deter other countries from using
chemical weapons on U.S. or allited
troops are over 40 years old and are
beginning to deteriorate somewhat.
The chemical agents are stored

The remaining agents are found in munitions such as bombs, mines, mortar rounds, rockets, spray tanks and artillery projectiles of various

and artillery projectiles of various sizes.

They are stored with or without their explosive components in secured outside storage areas, special warehouses and earthcovered igloos that protect the munitions from damage and protect the outside environment from accidental agent release. "Studies show that most of the stored chemical weapons are in good condition and present few problems with agent leakage, although last year nine leaks were detected inside the earthcovered igloos," according to Richard Slone, a public affairs officer with the Department of the Army.

Slone said that although nine leak inside the igloos occurred none of th gas leaked from inside the igloo and the leaks were detected almost im

gas leaked from instole by goo am to leaks were detected almost immediately.

But the biggest problem facing the Army is the destruction of the chemical supers my identified on-site incineration as the safest way to destruct the stope of the chemical weapons stockpile.

And in 1997 the international Chemical Weapons trusty was ratiefied by the U.S. Congress and direct the Army to destroy all its chemical weapons by 2007.

Currently only two destruction facilities are in opeation at the nine stonge sites.

They are at Johnston Island in &e Pacific and at Toole, Ulah. At Johnston Island 95 percent of the the more than 2.3 million pounds of chemical agents have been destroyed by incircatation with no harm to the environment, according to Officer vironment, according to Officer

But at Toole, Utah, a problem was detected a few weeks ago with a possible leak coming from one of the smoke stacks and it has been shut-down until a complete investigation can take place.

can take place.

At least one watchdog agency in Madison County has been very vocal in their opposition to destroying the chemicals at the Depot by incineration and the Army has agreed to look

at alternative methods to destroy the nerve gas and put their plans for in-cineration there on hold

"Safety for workers, the public and the environment is the paramount concern of the Army," Stone said. Congress has given the Army a deadline of 2007 to have all chemical weapons destroyed.
