First Baptist Church breaks ground for Educational Building

First Bapits Church in Mt. Vermon conducted a groundbreaking ceremony Sunday, May 28 at the site of a we educational building. The site is located adjacent to the existing educational facility of the church. The minated cost of the two-story structure, which will contain Sunday School rooms, kitchen, nursery, and a lowship hall, is \$1 million.

First Bapits Church was organized in 1887 in the Rockcastle County Courthouse. In 1889 a building was reted on Williams Street and served as the meeting place until 1920 when the current facility at Main and Craig tests was built. J.W. Mahan was pastor at that time. During the tenure of W.C. Younce from 1930 to 1947 a deem heating plant was installed in the church and a small parsonage was constructed. Wendell Belew became stor in 1948 and led the congregation to complete the Sunday School rooms in the basement, establish 8 ssion stations, and add the current educational building.

Participating in the groundbreaking were the long range planning committee, the church deacons, the church stor, I.P. Maynard Head, and members of the congregation. The new facility is expected to be completed in late 1.
