

New law would allow county to charge inmates

Those arrested in Rockcastle County may soon find themselves having to pay for their say in the local detention center. Rockcastle County Jailer James Miller said this week, that he is con-sidering presenting the Rockcastle Fiscal Court with a proposal that would allow the Detention Center to charge local prisoners for each day

would allow the Detention Center to charge local prisoners for each day they are in jail.

Miller said the 2000 General As-sembly passed a law that allows jails to levy such a fee for incarceration. Miller said that Daviess County Jailer Harold Taylor made a presen-tation last week to jailers and Judge-Executives from across the state out-lining aplan, he intends to implement in Daviess County on July 1st. His plan calls for local prisoners to pay a booking fee of \$20 and a \$20 a day fee for each day an inmate is in jail.

James and that he may initially propose only a booking fee of \$20 to \$25 for each person that is arrested and brought to the detention center.

"We have about 20 to 25 arrests in the county a week and just a booking fee alone would generate quite abit of money for the detention center," Miller said.

Rockeastle Buzz Carofitis said Wednesday that he was totally in favor of charging inmates.

"Taxpayers have footed all of the expenses associated with keeping immates in jails long enough, those convicted of committing a crime, should have to pay at least a portion of the cost," he said.

"Iresearched this very same thing several years ago, but because the state had no policy in place for such a prisoner pay program we were unable to implement one," he said.

Miller admitted that it was very unlikely that all of the local prisoners would be able to pay a fee for their incarceration, but he said there could be other ways for prisoners to take care of their debt such as community service work.

On Wednesday, eighteen local prisoners and 73 state prisoners were being held in the detention center. The county could not charge state prisoners, because the state is already paying \$26.23 to the county for their keep and they are also responsible for their own medical and dental bills.

Miller and Carloftis both admitted that charging prisoners a fee while
they are in jail, is a political issue.

"I'm for it, but I don't know how
the magistrates feel about it at this
point," Carloftis said.
