Rockcastle County High School Dress Code and Discipline Policies

Dress Code

Dress Code requirements apply to ALL students (male and female) and are to be followed during school hours, during school-sponsored events, and during extracurricular activities. Students that are participating in Physical Education classes must also adhere to all dress code requirements before entering the hallways or classrooms. The dress codes for the physical education classes will be set by those teachers of the physical education classes. However, shirts (those meeting dress code standards) must be worn at ALL times.

- Shoes must be worn at all times.
- Shorts, skirts, dresses and skirts (including those worn with leggings, etc) must be no shorter than three (3) inches from the top of the knee.
- No sleeveless shirts are permitted. This includes both males and females. This policy must also be adhered to while in attendance in physical education courses, both in the building and out of the building. Only those students that participate in a sport or club that have sleeveless shirts that are a recognized part of an official school uniform, will be the only ones to vary from this. Those types of shirts can only be worn during regular practice/competition times following the conclusion of the school day.
- Students are not permitted to possess nor wear sunglasses, hats (unless on a school recognized team/activity that a cap/hat is part of the recognized uniform one to do so such as softball and baseball, or JROTC), caps, nor bandannas.
- No clothing shall be permitted which promotes alcohol or drugs or which bears offensive language, pictures, signs, or offensive insinuations. Examples include, but are not limited to, "Big Johnson," "Co-Ed Naked," "Hooters," and numerous other brand names.
- All clothing must be properly buttoned, snapped, or otherwise fastened. This includes the straps on overalls. They must be buttoned properly the entire time they are worn.
- See-through clothing, bare midriffs and clothing containing holes which show bare skin above the knees are prohibited, as is any article of clothing considered indecent or distracting.
- Shirts must be of length that they could be tucked in and remain tucked in throughout the course of the school day. We are not attempting to enforce that shirts must be of proper length to cover the midriff region the entire time the shirt is worn.
- All clothing must be "form-fitting." Clothing that is excessively baggy will not be tolerated. This includes the bell-bottom and barrel-legged pants.
- All pants and shorts must be worn on the waist. The waist is considered for this purpose, the area ABOVE the tip of the hip bones. At no time will any undergarment that are normally worn under the pants/shorts be seen.
- COATS. At no time are trench coats or dusters allowed. Any coat or jacket that is considered to be excessively large can be required to be removed and placed in the student's locker or the office area at any time the administration sees fit.
- ALL DRESS CODE REQUIREMENTS MUST BE MET WHILE ON FIELD TRIPS/SCHOOL-SPONSORED ACTIVITIES. These trips/activities are viewed as an extension of the school and are within the jurisdiction of the school and the school's discipline policies.
- Students involved in HOMEcoming, PROM, and other social gatherings, must adhere to the dress code when purchasing items of clothing to be worn at those events. The school will not be responsible for any financial loss due to clothing that is deemed unacceptable in accordance with the RCHS Dress Code. It is the obligation of the student to consult with the administration and/or any committee developed before purchasing such items to determine the acceptability of such items for those occasions.

Dress Code for ALL Formal Dances

The dress code for the Jamboree Bowl and Homecoming Queen candidates and their escorts is as follows:

- The attire for the candidates and escorts will be informal (no tuxedos and no formal gowns). Males and females should select attire appropriate for church.
- Girls may wear sleeveless dresses, but no halter tops, spaghetti straps or revealing necklines (as determined by the school staff). The skirt length will be no shorter than three (3) inches above the knees.

The dress code for Prom, JROTC Military Ball and other formal dances is as follows:

- Males: The attire should be formal, i.e., dress jacket, shirt and tie, and dress slacks or tuxedos. No tee shirts, jeans, or cargo pants are permissible.
- Females: The attire should be formal. The length should be no shorter than fingertip length when the lady is standing straight. This length also applies to side slits. No bare midriff or excessively revealing necklines (as determined by the school staff) are permissible. No attire is permissible that reveals more than half of the back.

An Ordinance Adopting the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky Annual Budget for the Fiscal Year July 1, 2000 through June 30, 2001 ORDINANCE #4-2000

Whereas, an annual budget proposal and message have been prepared and delivered to the legislative body, and

Whereas, the legislative body has reviewed such budget proposal and modifications have been made accordingly.

Now, therefore, be it ordained by the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky as follows:

Section One: That the annual budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2000 and ending on June 30, 2001 is adopted as set forth herein:

Section Two: This budget ordinance shall be administered by the executive authority as prescribed and set forth in the Kentucky Revised Statutes. Administration shall include, but not be limited to, at least the following:

- Preparation and submission of financial statements which include budgetary comparisons on not less than a quarterly basis.
- Provide for budget amendments if requested by the legislative body or if anticipated through administration and implementation.
- Prepare any financial statements required for publication purposes, pursuant to KRS 424 and 91A.
- Cause each fund of this budget to be audited as prescribed by law.

Section Three: The detailed operating budget is adopted by reference for administration, accounting and reporting purposes.

Section Four: This ordinance shall be published in the newspaper by title and summary within thirty (30) days after adoption.

Section Five: This ordinance becomes effective immediately upon passage and publication as required by law.
