

# Time to pay controversial payroll tax

It is time to pay that highly con-roversial payroll tax, the City of Mt. Vermon passed earlier this year. Mt. Vermon City Clerk Kaye Rader said this week that forms were earling mailed to employers in the city limits, which would be filled out and sent back with the tax money paid by the employees.

"Employers will have until the end of July to submit the forms along with payment for the months of April, May and June," Rader said. All other people.

May and June, 'Rader said.
All other people working in the
city either for themselves or on a
contract basis will be obligated to
sup their tax each year when they file
their income taxes. That tax falls under the city's net profits tax, which
also includes professionals such as
lawyers and doctors.

Most employers in the city have
deducted the half percent tax from
their employees' check, but not all.

Mt. Vernon postmaster Ben Culbentson said that the finance of-fice in Louisville told him that there wasn't enough employees working at the two post offices for the finance office to collect the tax and forward to the city.

Culbertson said the 18 or so em-ployees of the post office had been given the proper forms and instructed what to do.

All those 65 years and older working in the city limits are exempt from

The payroll and net profits tax are expected to generate approximately \$600,000 a year in additional income for the city.

## Shots fired at Maretburg home

The Rockeastle County Sheriff's office is investigating a shooting incident which occurred in Marethurg last Friday morning.

According to Rockeastle County Deptty Sheriff Darrell Doan, someone fired four shots at the home of Barry and Chrysti Noble around 3:15 a.m. Friday morning.

Noble, who is assistant principal at Rockeastle County High School, aid he thought someone was prob-

at Rockeastle County High School, said he thought someone was prob-ably shooting at his dog, who was lying on the front porch of the house. Doan said the shots probably came from a high powered rifle, which had apparently been loaded with

Some of the buckshot hit Noble's
Nissan Pathfinder, flattening three of
the four tires.
More buckshot hit the side of
Noble's home but did not go through
the outside wall.
The Noble's dog was hit by a

piece of the buckshot.

Noone in the neighborhood heard any shots, but Noble said he heard his dog bark and the sound of the air coming out of his tires.

Doan said that whoever fired the

shots, was apparently on foot.

No arrests have been madeand the investigation continues.

Miller said that a few other deten-tion centers in the state had also grown gardens to help curtail cost. In the jail s garden you will find, potatoes, tomatoes, corn, green beans, cabbage, onions and peppers just to mention a few.

The County paid \$13,600 to Clark County for housing juvenile offenders and \$6,400 to Pulaski County for
