The cost of new construction will be nearly \$2 million dollars, all of which the hospital has in reserve funds for the project. The next step is to-

plans. Construction is expected to take two to two- and a- half years once approval is given. Arch II & Associ-ates, Inc. of Lexington developed the construction and renovation plans for

the hospital.

RHRCC currently employs 340 people with an annual payroll of 1

approximately \$8 million. Because of the expansion project, that number will increase, but by how much is not yet clear.

During Keene's tenure at RHRCC, many new programs and equipment, as well as new facilities, have been added such as the Medical Arts Build-ing, new operating rooms, acute care

beds and rehabilitation services.

Last August, the hospital received a three-year accreditation by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations and in February, it opened a Home Health Care Program that has recently become licensed by the state.


