## Rockets roll over Lincoln

Tolled into Stanford Friday night for

impressive 24-14 win.

Parsons completed seven of twelve pass attempts for 127 yards and he had 34 yards on ten carries.

The three year starter also threw for one touchdown and ran for another in leading the Rockets to vicouter in leading the Rockets to vic-tory for the second straight year in the Death Valley Bowl.

The ROCK fell behind in the first quarter, after Lincoln County scored on a reverse around right end. Defensive coordinator Tony Saylor recognized the formation and told his unit what to look for but they didn't execute and it cost them. A Lincoln County back scam-pered 28 yards for the score and the Lincoln County players and fins alike, thought the rout was on. The Rockets superior condition

began to show as early as the second quarter and the young Rocket players, who had not seen much action on Friday night a year ago began to realize they could handle themselves against the older Lincoln County team.

The Rocket defense completely shut down the Patriots for the next three quarters while scoring three more times of their own.

The Rockets second score of the

night, which gave them a 10-7 lead, was a fifty yard field goal by Terry. The kick set a new school record, which was formerly held by Raymond Blackburn, who had booted a 47 yarder.

Senior Greg Harper scored the third time for the Rockets on a forty yard pass play.

Parsons hit Harper on a dead run, on the right side of the field, late in the second quarter to give the Rock-

ets a 17-7 lead, which they took into half-time.

Neither team scored in the third quarter, although Rockeastle kept the ball on their end of the field most of

ball on their end of the field most of the quarter. Rockcastle's last score came on a one yard run by Parsons. Terry, who has had contact with several colleges, was three for three for water. All total the ROCK rolled up 290 yards of offense, on 41 running plays and 13 passing plays. Besides Parsons 177 yards of cotal offense, Sussell had 64 yards on 20 carries and he caught three passes

for 38 yards.

Junior Josh Hale had II yards on six carries and he caught two passes for 27 yards.

Junior fullback Clay Dooley had 14 yards on three carries and sophone Aaron Anderkin had three yards one one carry. Anderkin also completed one pass for 20 yards.

Harper caught three passes for a total of 98 yards.

Sophomore Marry Reagan had one carry for no yardage.
