Tobacco Loss Assistance with Regard to Estates.

With regard to Estates.

With regard to the reçent TLAPOO applications pertaining to estates for which ownership was not determined and the TLAP application was not complete; the following is being provided.

Several States have requested idance regarding ownership proof eligible to receive a TLAP00 pay ment. After careful consideration and in the spirit of protecting small farms and avoiding civil rights impacts, FSA is authorized to take a certification from the best source available. For example, where there are multiple heirs that are the rightful owners of a

property, FSA may take a certifica-tion from one or more of the owners as to the identity of the other owners and their share of the tobacco quota. In 'heir property' TLAP00 applica-tions, where some but not all heirs applied for a payment, the other heirs who wish to apply may file an appli-cation for payment through Decem-ber 1, 2000. Each payment approved under this late-filed provision must be concurred with by the Kentucky be concurred with by the Kentucky State FSA Committee (STC).

For purposes of TLAPOO only, land-owners will not be required to produce a, legal document fo continuous ownership in for treadily available. Burley tobacco farmers applied at FSA offices for compensation under the Tobacco Loss Assistance Program (TLAP) the deadline of Sept. 15, 2000. USDA will distribute \$340 untilion to compensate tobacco farmers who suffered a reduction of to-bacco quota or acreege for the 1999bacco quota or acreage for the 1999-2000 crop years. Kentucky's share is \$140 million.

As directed by Congress, farmers of designated types of tobacco will receive a portion of the \$340 million to help defray lost income resulting

from declining quotas and allotments, Individual farm payments for burley tobacco will be split three ways be-tween farmers, quota owners, and those in control of the quotas (farm operators). Payments under the sec-ond year of TLAP will be based on the 2000 crop quota.

For organizations like boy scouts, girls scouts or other groups, the farmer's loss could be a gleaning op-portunity for those abled bodied per-sons who want to raise money. Un-harvested cars of corn are a lot like pennies scattered across a farmers field, and with the producers permis-sion, supervised children could gather up field loss com to benefit a charity of their choice, A similar opportunity exists in orchards where apples are left on the trees, or in pumpkin and squash patches where leftover pro-duce remains. Other potential glean-ing situations are available during the larvest season for those who are willharvest season for those who are will-ing to perform the task of hand pickthat which can not be meel ing that which can not be mechanically harvest. Organizations can plan a group outing by calling a farmer they know and asking for permission to glean his fields. Gleaning helps the

Honey Month September was designated as national honey month, which com-memorates the beneficial contribumemorates the beneficial contribu-tion honeybees make to agriculture by pollinating the crops across America. Over 25% of the consumer's dictiteday consists of foods which are made possible by bees that carry pol-len from plant to plant. The tireless worker bees live for five or six worker that gather the nectar which becomes honey. Worker bees can cover about 55,000 miles and visit over 2 million flowers in order toproduce one pound of honey. Bees have maintained a symbiotic relationship with agricul-ture since the first farmer started rais-

of honey. Bees have maintained a symbiotic relationship with agriculture since the first farmer started raising crops thousands of years ago. The history of beckeeping goes back even further as evidenced by cave paintings that date back to 7000BC. The honey from bees is a natural sweetener that is very nutritious, and an excellent cooking additive or baking ingredient. While honey primarily consists of glucose, fructose and water, it also contains vitamins, mingredient, annion action and trace enzymes. The natural combination of these components are the source of honey's medical characteristics. Both internal and external applicationsofthoney have, been found to have specific health benefits.
