Dr. McElwain has been involved

with Health Kentucky since 1984, serving as the organization's Medi-cal Director. In 1999, the Board of cal Director, in 1999, the Board of Directors elected him president of Health Kenucky. Through his lead-ership and innovation, the organiza-tion has provided medical services to more than 200,000 Kenuckians and received several national recognitions and awards. Under his guidance volunteerism has increased, new funding opportunities have been cre-ated and the organization's vision for the future has solidified. In addition to his work with Health Kentucky, Dr. McElwain has previ-ously held positions such as Associate Director of the Lexington-Fayette Co. Health Department, Commis-sioner of Health for the Kentucky Department of Health and President

sioner of Health for the Kentucky Department of Health and President of the Kentucky State Board of Medi-cal Licensure. He also helped de-velop a voluntary satiewide indigent care program for the Kentucky Health Care Access Foundation and the Ken-tucky Medical Association's (KMA) Kentucky Physician Care Program, which has been replicated in several states.

Dr. McElwain is the Medical Directorof Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center's Emergency Department and lives in Mr. Vernon. He is a Kentucky native and a graduate of the University of Louisville School of Medicine.
