Cattle lice populations increase as

one of the least expensive treatments. However, it isn't desirable to get animals wet when temperatures are low. Alternatives are pour-ons and dusts, both of which are relatively dry. Consult

which are relatively dry. Consult local vets for products which are working best in herds they work with. Ask for products which can be applied without catching cattle in a head gate. Many products use a heavy mineral oil carrier which, when applied to their back, can be easily seen. On small herds, cattle can be treated as they eat at feed bunks. Season-long control, treat all amounts and retreat all animals of the treat all animals coming into the herd are treated to 21 days later to kill any lice which then lice should be no problem. Cattle producers are advised to read labels carrefully before buying products to control cattle lice. Two

Some products have an applicator or measuring device to help you deliver an accurate dose, especially when the rate is just a few cc's per head. Also check the label for cautions or restrictions, such as and protective: equipment to use during applications.
