This plan will allow anyone - parents, grandpar-ents, family and friends - to lock in today's tuition rates and begin pay-ing for a child to attend college to-morrow. The pre-paid tuition credit can be used as institutions both inside

and outside of the state We created the Commonwealth Merit Scholarship Program to pro Ment Scholarship Program to pro-vide scholarships for students based on their high school, grade point av-erages (GPA) and ACT scores. The Merit Scholarship can be applied to the tuition at any Kentucky college, technical school or university and are repounds if the student projection. renewable if the student maintains at least a 3.0 GPA. A student with a GPA above 2.5 can receive scholarship funds and at least a 15 on the ACT toqualify for scholarshipmoney based on the exam. For example, a student with a 40 high school GPA and an ACT score of 28 or above an earn a Merit Scholarship of \$2,500 a upgar and a total of \$10,000. Work-study: Part-time employment either on or off campus that allows students tocarm money to help pay the cost of education.

Leans: Money borrowed/ocover the cost of education. Leans must be repaid with interest.

-Military benefits: Financial as-sistance to individuals (or to their dependents) who have performed military service. Another option is the National Guard, an organization that offers the best of both worlds with weekend training and educa-tional benefits. tional benefits

Grants: Assistance that usually does not have to be repaid. Grant awards are usually based on financial.

doesn't have to be repaid. Scholar-ship awards are usually based on skill, ability, talent or achievement. Waivers: Anarrangement offered by some institutions to forego spe-cific higher education costs for stu-dents who meet unique qualifications. Contact the schools you are consider

Some hyproduct leeds are high in fiber, but the fiber is highly digestible. Highly digestible fiber sources can give performances

similar to, or greater than, starch— type supplements such as corn.

Farmers across Kentucky, and particularly in western Kentucky, are feeding more and more soyhulls. The hulls fed with forage are a good source of feed for cattle while saving

The key to successful use of the byproduct feed is to ensure that it contains 13 percent protein to provide the needed protein for the calves development. It may require mixing of products such as a combination of solyhulls and compluent to attain that level.
