### County trying to reach agreement for shelter

The Rockeastle County Fiscal Court and board members with the Rockeastle County Adoption Agency will meet in January to try and reach an agreement on acounty dog pound. Last August, the court and Terry Lunce, also with RAAP, discussed the matter at length and agreed to have a contract between the court and RAAP drawn.

Burdette drew up a contract between the county and RAAP, but the two parties could not reach agreement on it. Rockcastle County Judge-Execu-Buzz Carloftis offered labor,

materials and equipment for the con-struction of a dog pound in the Roundstone area of the county, but RAAP apparently wanted more and the two parties have been at a standthe two parties have been at a stand-still ever since.

However Myers told the court that if the two parties could not reach agreement soon, RAAP could lose out on as much as \$65,000 in funding from the state.

# Lovell may plead guilty to murder

A Rockeastle County man is expected to plead guilty on Friday to the shooting death of another local man in 1997.

David Lovell, 33, of Burr will appear in Rockeastle Circuit Courtin connection with the murder of Charles Toddy' Baker, who was found buried 14 feet below heearth's surface at Tark Hill in 1999.

Police say that Lovell : d his wife Barbara, 28, shot and killed Baker and then buried his body wha buildozer. The Lovells have since divorced.

An informant eventually lead police to Baker's badly decomposed

body in 1999. Commonwealth Attorney Eddy

Dody in 1999.

Commonwealth Attorney Eddy Montgomery confirmed that Lovell would appear in court on Friday and that he may or not enter a plea.

However he said that is the main reason he has been brought back to the Rockeastle Detenijon Center and that if Lovell does plead, it will be a plead of guilty to some kind of muder charge.

Montgomery said that he could not say as to the amount of prison inter Lovell would get, but that any sentence would likely nut concurrently with a foderal sentence he received earlier this year for drug charges.

Lovell and several members of his family were indicted and eventually pled guilty to drug trafficking involving the sell of cocaine. In April, Lovell's former wife Barbara, pled guilty to first degre assault in connection with the Baker murder. She told police that she did shoot

She told police that she did shoot Baker, but that he was not deat and her husband shot him again.
Barbara Lovell received a sentence of 10 years, which is running concurrently with her sentence in dedrat court for drug rafficking.
After Barbara Lovell pled guitly in April, she turned state's evidence against her former husband.
