Shortly after the meeting, at least three people from the county road crew and Deputy Sheriff Darrell Doan came to my home, while I was at work and removed crossties which were placed on my property line to prevent public encroach-ment upon my land. Where the crossties were placed cannot be disputed. The Fiscal Court has agreed that these crossties were on my property. Refer to correction printed in the Mt. Vernon Signal dated August 19, 1999: The county road crew threw these crosstles into a stack and scattered some of them on my front lawn, damaging my flowers and shrubs. The county should be held liable for this damage.

Clearly, it. is no polinion, as well as my lawyer's opinion, the office of the Rockcastle County Judge, and its representatives have abused the power of its office, by committing the tort of trespassing and interfering with private property. This is not what democracy
