(Well you prob-iably DID when you dug a two or three foot hole into clay med and added water around your new tree!) Sometimes trees seem to forgive us for mistakes and recover and grow well any way.

well anyway.

My advice is this. Dig a hole or two. Post hole size or tree ball size. Fill with five gallons of water. Check the next day for water in your hole. If there is still part of the five gallons of water in your test hole — you'd bet-ter make sure you have a guarantee if you insist on planting your new tree in this small pond! Because it will

probably drown.

During high temperature and lo During high temperature and own moisture conditions, watering your tree once a week for several minutes is much better than a little sprinkle daily. (If you're going to mist the leaves; only to have them be dry in three minutes of sunshine, at least add some anti-desiccani compound to your water. This creates a film on es and keeps them from wilt
