## **Council votes** for employee drug testing

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted on Monday night to continue on a path of drug testing for all 32 city employees.
The council voted to contract with

Two of the city's employees, Denis McClure and Junior Gray, who have their CDL license will be required to take the drug test initially. The rest of the city's employees will be put in a computer and randomly chosen to take the test. The council also agreed that they should not pay for any rehabilitation for an employee who tested positive for them.

The council discussed the possi-The council discussed the possi-bility of allowing employees who test possive and go to rehat on their own, be allowed to get their job back. The council did not make any deci-sion on that matter and basically loft it up to the Mayor. The initial cost to the city for the

drug testing will be \$967.00. Each test that its conducted after that will be \$67.50 each. The drug test will be \$67.50 each. The drug test will be conducted at the Rockeastle Hospital, who will forward the samples to the National Safety Alliance.
Mink said that the city would be notified within 24 hours of any postive result.

"It will just be the luck of the draw for everyone, some employees may never be tested and some may be tested a couple of times a year," Mink
