The Burley Tobacco Advisory
Committee, established by the Sec-retary of Agriculture, recommended
on June 14, 2000, that a method be developed that would enable a better
allocation of tobacco graders and warehouse sailes opportunity. Ware-house designation has been in place for Flue-Currel tobacco, for several

years.
"FSA is making this change in the tobacco program in response to a request from Burley tobacco growers and the industry," Hall said. Begin-

ning with the 2001 marketing year all Burley tobacco marketing cards will be issued for the specific pounds and selling location designated by the farmer. "Only those pounds designated on themarketing card has appe-cific buying location may be pre-sented for sale at that location," Half-sald,

Farmers selling at traditional aucie individual sellind according to cards they have used in recent years. These cards will indicate the producer's designated warehouse. Marketing cards for producers selling at non-sustion sites will be saued by thermal but coded cards. These cards will indicate the designated buyer. 
