son, deal with children in their program on a one to one basis.

"Love, food, clothes and most importantly caring about the children are things that we provide—it seems to really make a difference when children think someone cares about them," Napier told the board.

Napier told many stories of tragedy and many stories of horrible situations for children and he also told stories of children who had overcome their situation with the help of the Migrant program to prosper.

Napier related one story in which a family was basically homeless and had a school age child, who overcame all of the obstacles to eventually make straight A's in school.

Recruiter Tabatha Denny said that the majority of those helped are people looking for work in agricultural or already working in the agricultural field.

Those admitted to the Migrant program must also be new to the county and once a student enters the program they are allowed to stay in it for a three year period.

But Napier admitted that if a family moves across county lines and stay a couple of months they are allowed to go back into the program, if they move back to the county.

Napier said that Ms. Denny visits each school two to three times a week to check on new students and find out some information about them to see if she should conduct an interview with the family to see if they qualify for the program. Ms. Denny also places flyers throughout the county explaining the Migrant program.

Napier said that the Migrant program has worked with several other local agencies such as the Christian Appalachian Project and Daniel Boone Development to find housing for homeless families but today there is currently one family Napier knows of that is still basically homeless because they do not have electricity, running water or sewer, "but we are working on it," he said.

Napier also said that home visits with parents and children are a big part of his program and that the Migrant Program keeps a close watch on each individual in the program throughout the three years.

Napier said that although the Hispanic population was as high here as in some counties he thought the program would need a Bi-Lingual staff member in the very near future.

"Rockcastle currently doesn't have a large Hispanic population but because we don't have enough housing for the very low income families—but it is going to become a problem," he said.

The Migrant Program offices are located on Richmond Street across from the Rockcastle County Board of Education.

10 years imprisonment for the offenses of two counts of Burglary, First Degree and two counts of Robbery, First Degree.

Delbert W. Leger, 26, of Mt. Vernon, was sentenced to a period of seven years imprisonment for the offense of Criminal Possession of a Forged Instrument, First Degree. Judge William T. Cain gave Leger until July 13, to report to jail.

William R. Crawford, 41, of Lexington, was sentenced to a period of one year imprisonment for the offense of DUI, 4th.

Former Rockcastle County Deputy Jailer James A. Amyx, 23, of Mt. Vernon, entered a guilty plea to the offenses of Sodomy, First Degree, Sodomy, Second Degree, Sexual Abuse, First Degree, Sexual Abuse, Second Degree and Sexual Abuse, Third Degree.
