Parents arriving on the scene were corted to a designated area of the escorted to a designated area of the Middle School to await information on the condition of the wounded. Parents were informed as soon as possible about the condition of their children. Some parents were staged to go directly to the hospital, while some came to the school first and then to the hospital. They were met by a hospital representative and di-rected to a waiting area for incoming information.

The entire drill lasted approximately 55 minutes from the time the shooter entered the building until the wounded had been assessed at the hospital.

A follow-up meeting will be scheduled with participating agencies to assess the drill and determine acas of needed improvement.
