

Times Square church meets Appalachia

Members of the Times Square Church came from far reaches—from Kenya to Puerto Rico, Trinidad to Tobago, Barcelona to Brooklyn. No matter what part of the globe they originate from, they have one thing in common—the desire to serve God.

While driving 16 hours to Mt. Vernon and to the hollows of Eastern Kentucky, members of this non-denominational church of 103 nationalities, which is based in the center of Times Square in New York City, prepared themselves to work with Christian Appalachian Project (CAP) volunteers and employees in constructing the first new home for a CAP Housing Program participant in Rockcastle County. This project was made possible by the partnership between Daniel Boone Development, who provided materials, and CAP, who provided labor.

"One of the most interesting revelations about this project has been learning the importance of standards, rulers, and measurements, and how you must follow guidelines in order for the foundation to set straight and the construction to be stable. It's also like that with faith—you must stay in the boundaries, follow the rules, and remain in the borders of Biblical teaching," commented Gail Shelby, a resident of Manhattan and first-time construction worker.

This group of multi-lingual, multi-cultural New Yorkers set up camp with the Faith Harvest Fellowship in Mt. Vernon, a relatively new church that opened their arms to a band of eager servants.

During their stay with CAP and Faith Harvest Fellowship, the members of the Times Square Church collaborated with Faith Harvest Fellowship in their Wednesday night church service. Combining their talents, the group celebrated the time of fellowship with dinner, a puppet show, and skit night.

Faith Harvest Fellowship is led by Rev. Mike Bryant, a former social worker and police officer. Bryant founded the church on the basis of serving the down-trodden, overlooked, indigent, and forgotten. His ministry serves various areas of the community and includes the following: prison outreach at the local jail, a women's group, a men's group, cell ministry, and a number of other programs just getting launched. In an interesting parallel, the Times Square Church is similar to Faith Harvest in that it was founded by David Wilkerson and seeks to reach out to runaways, drug addicts, and the

churches wanting to host groups coming to work in the community. It is CAP's hope that the churches and local agencies will soon discover the benefits of partnering with CAP to help families through these projects," CAP Volunteer Houses Program Manager Sherry Allen said.

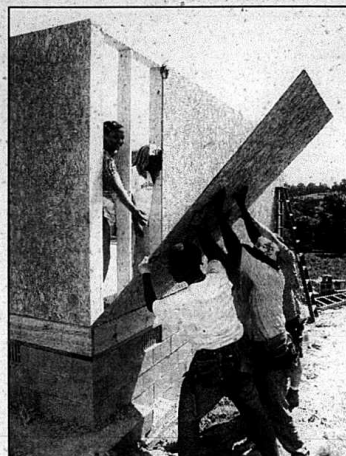
