## Apply now for free septic systems

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court has received federal grant ap-plicants for a new program that will pay [00 percent of the cost of install-ing and replacing septic systems in the county.

Rockcastle Judge-Executive Rockeastle Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotits said the program is part of the PRIDE program, which is headed by U.S. Congressman Harold Rogers of Somerset.
The gold of the new program is to replace inadequate systems and to build new systems to replace straignt line pipes which allow raw sewage tor un into the ground.
The Rockeastle Fiscal Court must have a assessment of the number of homes wanting the free septic systems.
