Should You Take Advantage of Low Interest Credit Card Offers?

Before you switch to one of the many credit cards that offer an initial 0% annual percentage rate (APR), check out all the other features. The APR is irrelevant for people who pay off their balance in full each month, but here are some other things to consider:

Does the new card have a grace period that allows you between 10 and 15 days to make your payment? Some of these low interest credit cards no longer offer a grace period at all - you are charged from the first day you make a purchase. Also, some of them have reduced the length of the grace period.

While the grace periods are shrinking on many of these new

credit cards, the late-payment fees are rising. Late fees are often as high as \$29, while your old credit card might only charge \$10.

Is this low interest just a teaser for a short period of time before a higher, permanent rate kicks in? The introductory rates on most of these cards are in effect for 6 months or less. And, the minute you make a

late payment, the rates jump to a higher one, usually ranging from 14% to 21%.

These are some of the changes you need to be aware of. Before you switch, compare the new card with your old one feature by feature.
