Trees in conflict with electric lines

Electricity is something we take for granted usually. But, when ice or wind brings limbs or whole trees creating into power cables, suddenly there is a forced recognition of a rouplesome situation. roots as well as all forms of digging can be just as apt to cause injury to both cables and people, not to men-tion interruption of services.

If you are faced with replacing storin damaged trees, or are seriously considering a landscaping overhaul, select carefully any trees you decide to plast under or you near our contents.

Also, their trucks must have access to poles and lines. Plan new landscapes with low-growing trees, shrubs, flowers underscath electric wries. Plant median sized shade trees, if you wish, at distances greater than 13' from electric lines. In the backyard, anywhere they won't cause a problem, plant large trees if you wish and your yard will provide them sufficient room when they reach full size at maturity. Plant trees in such manner as to not damage roofs, siding, foundations, sidewalliss and driveways. Be mindful kide may climb your trees someday— if there are power lines nearby. This could become a dangerous situation.
