Reckeastle County Middle School has announced it will participate in the 2003 state National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP). RCMS is one of only 249 schools in the siste asked to participate. The 2003 state NAEP assessment, which requires about 90 minutes of a student's time, is designed to measure what students know and can do in reading and mathematics. Students will be asked to read for literary experience, to gain information, and to perform a task. They will respond to multiple-choice questions in reading and they may also be asked to create their own responses), which may consist of writing short sinvers of one concentrations.
