Hofden, 31, was arrested at his home in Northside Apartments, after Hellard saw him coming out of the Mt. Vernor Pentecostal Church. Hellard said that Holden had apparently broken into the First Christian Church on West Main Street before he went to the Pentecostal Church.

A Pulaski County youth, with a large family in Rockcastle County, died last Friday at the University of Kentucky Medical Center.
Ricky Dee Bussell, 16, son of Rick Bussell and Cindy Sears and grandson of Dealva Sr. and Mary Bussell of Brochbead, died after he was involved in a head-on collision in Nancy on Thursday night.
According to police, Bussell lost control of his Nissan truck on the slick highway and crossed the center line, hitting a Toyota SUV, also driven by another Pulaski County resident.
