Winter Interest in the Landscape

Cold days arrived early last fall and I heard several say they enjoyed the white Christmas.

There is little daylight either bere or after work by which to enjoy
e outdoors at mid-winter. But, for e outdoors at mid-winter. But, for ose, who are enjoying retirment, ere are certainly some interesting ings to see and do in the yard. For ost, at least a day or two off from-e regular grind can mean a few uss free to do whatever strikes your nicy for wintertime outdoor enjoy-

winter.

Examples are frostbitten grasses waving in the cold wind, flower seed heads crowned with a lod of spow, a goldfine, betwacting seeds, from a dried pinecone or dried teasel. Such are most glorious in winter.

Miscanthui, pennésetum, panicum, chrismathium and other grass species may indeed have been placed in the landscape scheme primarily because of their wintertime attractiveness.

Some perennials that I like save throughout the winter and nemove the dead stalks or seed hearom include coneflowers, sedu

(especially "Autumn Joy"), canna, yarrow, hyssop, salvia, teasel and ar-temisia.

Some trees and shrubs exhibit nice characteristics we may not notice at other times of the year. Do you notice red twigs on blueberries, some wilewas and degwoods in summe? Probably not! Without their foliage, such plants can look striking against the white of snow.

Corkscere willows, contorted filberts, winterberry hollies, are all piemes striking minus their leaves. Wisteria, grapevines, passionflower types, offer nice form covering a post, trellis, or arch during the wintertime. Some folias may think dead vines and seed heads are signs of laziness.
