# A Veteran Remembered

In Tribute to Christine and the late Earl Phillips

Submitted by Gary Phillips was an Army veteran of WW. II. in the beginning of his career, he was a Military Engineer, after passing a four year college final exam. His second rank was Sergeant.

On D-Day, Sgt. Phillips was one of the Anglo-American Expedition-party Forces who struck the French coast in the most gigantic amphibitions of the Anglo-American Expedition on Normandy. He was extensively wounded wice. After being hospitalized for nine months in England, and still recovering, he served over two yeas as in MP.
