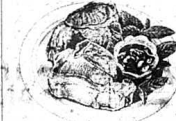

4-H Camp gearing up

As the school doors in Kentucky schools close for another summer, thousands of young people will continue the learning process through 4H Camps. Nearly 10,000 youngsters will be attending one of the state's four residential 4H camps this summer. Another 15,000 will participate in county day camps held in various local sites across Kentucky. Camps range in size from 300 to 1,500 acres and have modern facilities including cabins, dining halls, swimming pools, and lakes for canoeing and fishing.

4H Camp provides young people with a chance to learn life skills, hobbies. Some will learn to swim, paddle a canoe or square dance. Crafts, nature study, fishing, archery and shooting sports are also a part of the long list of activities available to keep everyone involved throughout the day.

In addition to having fun, 4H camping emphasizes personal development. Young people are given the opportunity to develop and practice social skills, experience leadership roles and make friendships that sometimes last a lifetime.

More than 3,000 volunteers help direct campers. Each camp is also staffed with emergency medical

technicians, certified lifeguards and instructors for nature and recreation and more.

Sign up for 4H Camp is just beginning in Rockcastle County. Camp slots are on a limited basis and fill up quickly. Cost of the five day residential camp is \$85. The cost includes transportation to and from camp, 13 meals, and four nights of overnight lodging. Youth need to check with the county Extension agent to fine out about availability and camp details.
