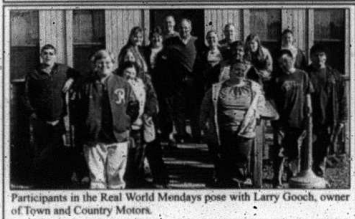

Real World Mondays

On March 10, 2003 Job Quest at RCHS started Real World Mondays and took the "Road Rules Challenge" with eighteen students attending.

Car Shopping Monday began with a kick-off at Wendy's in Mt. Vernon. After students were treated to a sandwich and drink, they boarded the bus for a visit to Town & Country Motors in Mt. Vernon where they met with a car salesman and purchased (simulated) a vehicle of their choice and were photographed with their "dream car". Each student was given their photo and a copy of the purchase order for their file.

The second week, What's It Cost Monday, continued our car buying process with Mr. Larry Gooch, owner of Town and Country Motors, visiting RCHS to give us in-depth information on the do's and don'ts when buying a vehicle. His informative presentation included interest and credit information.

No Wreck Mondays challenged each student to purchase insurance on the vehicle which they had selected. State Farm Insurance provided our Job Quest students with an insurance quote on their new ride. Mrs. Bullock and Mrs. Rumsey discussed vehicle insurance coverage and limits along with an overview on interest and credit reports.

Our next stop, Show Me The Money, took us to Community Trust Bank where we met with loan officer, Cory Craig. Mr. Craig explained the auto loan application process and calculated a loan amount and monthly payments according to the students pre-assigned age, occupation, credit rating.

On the fifth Monday session at Gooper's Garage with a Kyle Rader and Ralph Baker. They discussed Classic Cars, vehicle maintenance, and taught students the basic ways to waste and/or save money on their cars.

On The Road Monday was our next challenge in the car buying venture. We visited Norma Houk at the County Court Clerk's Office to pay tax and get a license for our vehicles. Our Real World Mondays ended on April 28th, with a Final Episode: New Ride. The Car Show began with pizza for all, then, each student showed their new vehicle to the panel of judges for awards, certificates, ribbons, and gifts. Two students had perfect attendance for the entire seven week event.

"It is Written"

In the scriptures we are warned and cautioned many times that about being deceived. In Matt 24:4-5 we read, "And Jesus answered and said unto them, 7 take heed that no man deceive you. For many shall come in my name, saying, I am Christ, and shall deceive many." The ASV translates the phrase "lead many astray." The NAS translates the phrase "mislead many." In 14 or 6:9-10, "Know ye not that the unrighteous shall not inherit the kingdom of God? Be not deceived: neither fornicators, nor idolaters, nor adulterers, nor effeminate, nor abusers of themselves with mankind, nor thieves, nor covetous, nor drunkards, nor revellers, nor extortioners, shall inherit the kingdom of God." We could cite other verses like, 1 Cor 15:33, Gal 6:7-8, 1m 1:16, etc., that warn us about being misled. Now being misled is a common problem among men, back then as today. People are misled on moral issues, as well as in spiritual, doctrinal topics. Jesus gives the reasons why people get misled. "Jesus answered and said unto them, Ye do err, not knowing the scriptures, nor the power of God." Matt 22:29. "Either people don't know the scriptures or they simply deny what God says. All error that people are misled is one or the other or a combination of both." To avoid being misled, know what God says in his word, and believe and obey what you learn, it keep you on the right path, in the straight and narrow way!
