\$4 million judgement

A Rockcastle County jury awarded the family of a former Sowder Nursing Home patient 54 million last Thursday, after a five day trial in Rockcastle Circuit Court. In their vedrict, the juros indicated that the nursing home, which is now owned by the Rockcastle Hospital, was 70 percent responsible for the woman's death and that local physician Dr. Karen Saylor was 30 percent responsible. Antoneys for Roberta Powers, a woman in her mid-30s, told the court that she died from Lithium positioning in 1998 while under the care of the nursing home.

Both parties found at fault have said they will appeal the verdict.

Dr. Saylor said Tuesday that she is always mournful about the death of a patient, but that she had done nothing wrong and tried every waypossible to help her patient. No local attorneys were involved in the case. The judgement was not the largest ever in Rockcastle County, in a civil case.
