## Heather Hammond wins three state championships at State Track and Field meet

Rockeastle County High School sophomore Heather Hammond electrified a captive audience and literally dominated chree of her four events in the 2003 KTCCCA Class AS State Track & Field Champion ships held at the University of Kentucky this past Friday and Saturday. Heather, already a two-time state champion including tultes in the 400-meter dash and 1600-meter relay as an eighth grader, added three more state titles to her growing collection giving her five state championship titles to date.

Some athletes may be capable of winning both in a recuplar season competition, or ever at region, but a select few have ever tried both at the state level and had any success, let alone win them both. None in recent KTCCCA history have been able to overcome the grueling 400-meter hardles with almost no rest or recovery time.

Last season, Heather made a val-iant attempt at this nearly impossible

feat. She competed well in both events at state last season and finished as state runner-up, despite opinions from other coaches and efficials throughout the state that it was a waste of time doing both and that winning them back-to-back couldn't be done.

This sesson, Heather viewed that scenario as her main focus and challenge. She made it her goal from day lone. The 400-meter dash went exactly as Heather had planned. She cruised to a neasy victofy in her heat, securing a top spot in Saturday's B 1 and the security of the second state of 101:18. Almost immediately came to 500-meter hardles.

Once again, Heather claimed the top spot in her, heat and overall with an easy victory in a spectacular 47.5.

The last event on Friday for the girls was one of their best - long jump. Heather and sophomore teammate Chere Embs sought to put RCHS on the storeboard. The girls and placed in the top two spets in regional competition.

tory. She recorded two jumps of 16'10", two jumps of 17'1", and her eventual best of 17'2". Heather easily won the state championship in this event by nearly 8" over her nearest

event by nearty 8 over her nearest competitor. Her worst jump would have won the state title by 4. Both Heather and Chere scored a combined 11 points for RCHS, ranking them fourth among all teams after the first day of competition. Saturday's finals proved to be just

Saturday's finals proved to be just as exciting for RCHS. Freshman Kayla Hayes, régional champion in both the 1600 and 3200-meter russ, sought her first-ever state titles in the events. order to prepare for her historic attempt at the 400 and 300 hurdles.

Heather was forced to rush through
the high jump competition, since it is in direct conflict with her other two
events.

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Still, Heather managed an impressive seventh place finish with a leap of 4\*10°.

Coincidentally, 5'4" won this year's state-title, matching Heather's best effort of the season.

With high jump out of the way, Heather became focused on her selson long goal - back-to-back state titles in the 400 meter dash and 300-meter hurdles. The 400 featured her rival for the past three years from Paducah Tilghman, senior sensation Temi Akojie. Akojie won state titles in the 100-meter and 200-meter, dashes during this year's competition

and also won the 400 as a runner for St. Mary's before transferring to Paducah. Heather had defeated Akojie the past two years at state, but Akojie entered the competition much improved and the number one ranked runner in the 400-meter dash in Class 2A.

Heather got off to a great start in the race and set the pace with a bistering first one hundred meters. She led through the first three-fourths of the race when Akojie finally pulled even. The girls battled the entire last 100 meters, with the state title on the line. At the wire, Heather edged Akojie in a near photo finish for he recond state championship title in the event. Heather's awesome time of \$8.64 seconds shattered her own RCHS, record in the event in state competition.

With half of her goal realized with the 400-meter dash state champion-ship, the 300-meter hurdle race and a chance to possibly make history was only precious moments away. the 400, she ran one of her best hurdle races of the year, despite her apparent exhaustion. Heather was giver seriously challenged in the race until the very end as she sitarted to ease up near the finish. Nevertheless, her challenger's last second effort was now, with the 300-meter's hurdle state champioghship tile in 48.03 seconds. Heather had realized her goal, winning both the 400-meter dash and the 300-meter hurdles back-to-back. Certainly a historic moment and a feat that no one seemied to be able to recall having been accomplished be-

Along with her three state cham-jonships in the 400, 300 hurdles, and long jump, as well as her finish in high jump, Heather earned an Rish record 32 points for her team at state. Amazingly, her 32 points would have ranked there eighth among the top ten earns in the Class 2A, State Champi-onships by herself. Heather will au-listate in all three events that she won including the 400, 300 hurdles, and long jump.
