Historic marker for Red Foley boyhood home

The public is invited to attend the unveiling of Historic Marker #2114 to be placed at the site of the Boyhood home of Red Foley on Thursday, July 10 at 10 a.m.

The home is located at the intersection of Memeaus Road/Highway 595 in Berea.

Born Clyde Julian Foley on July 17, 1910 and nicknamed "Red" for his hair, he was recruited by Chicago's WLS Radio Station to perform on their Barn Dance in 1931. The Barn Dance was later renamed the National Barn Dance and broadcast on NBC in 1933. Foley helped found the Reno Valley Barn Dance in 1938, hosted the Grand Ole Opry's "Prince Albert Show" from 1946-1953 and ABC's "Ozark Jubilee" from 1955-60.

turned out to be registered to a Mount Vernon minister whose son was driv-

ing the car and was not involved in the attempted robbery.

A second unsuccessful robbery attempt, according to police, was made further south on KY 39 at Pearl's Grocery.

The crime spree began shortly before 3 p.m. Sunday when Hampton ran his own vehicle into a ditch on Cemetery Road near Waynesburg.

According to police reports, Hampton grabbed a rifle out of his vehicle and stopped a car belonging to Rene P. Rodriguez of Tolley Road, Waynesburg.

Hampton, allegedly forced Rodriguez and a passenger, Dosencos Gonzalez of Danville out of the car at gunpoint and robbed Gonzalez of \$200 in cash.

As the three stood on the road, a pickup truck belonging to Shelby and Lucille Justice of Tolley Road happened by. Gonzalez jumped in the back of the pickup and told the Justices to "fly," which they did. Hampton gave chase in Rodriguez's car but didn't catch them.

While police were investigating the car theft and robbery on Cemetery Road, a call came in about the attempted robberies in Pulaski County in which the suspect was driving the stolen car.

The Rodriguez car was later found burned on Parker Road near Waynesburg and Hampton was tracked to a home on Ellison-Pulaski Road.

Hampton was arrested and police say further arrests may be made.

Hampton was on probation from jail after entering guilty pleas in two separate cases in the past seven months.

He pleaded guilty in November to wanton endangerment charges for shooting at an occupied house last

March. He was sentenced to two years in prison but the sentence was probated for three years.

Earlier this year, he pleaded guilty to charges that he held a knife to an ex-wife's throat and threatened to beat her or kill her over custody of their child. He was sentenced to 30 days in jail. That sentence also was probated.

Hampton, whose lives at 930 Ellison Rd., Waynesburg, was about to have his probation revoked for not attending drug treatment classes, refusing to submit to drug tests and failing to report to his probation officer.

Circuit Judge William Cain last month ordered his probation revoked

but police had not located Hampton until finding him at a house on Ellison-Pulaski Road shortly after 7 p.m. Sunday after the alleged car theft and attempted robberies.

Thus far, Hampton has been charged with two counts of robbery, theft of the car and tampering with evidence in the burning of the stolen

car. Kentucky State Police Trooper Bill Collins said that after he was arrested, Hampton told officers, "I torched my Mexican's car."

In addition to Collins, Troopers Eric Taylor and Chris Crockett were involved in the case as well as Bill Schmitzler and Ron Luster of the Lincoln County Sheriff's office.

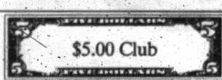
