What is a Pap Smear?



Presented by Dr. George W. Griffith.

Pap smears are the primary method of detecting early cancer of the cervix (the tip of the uterus). In fact, the test is so useful and sensitive, it can detect changes as they are occurring, years before they ever become cancerve become cancerve.

Pap smears are graded on a scale, depending on how severe the changes are. The range is from perfectly normal to cancerous. When a woman is found to have an abnormalizy. These ininor changes can be recheated in a few monthy. Often these changes are due to inflammation, such as from an infection with yeard or trichomopas. These possibilities should be chiecked out and treated before the Pap smear is repeated.

More severe changes call for a prompt evaluation.
