Hale graduates with highest distinction from Georgetown

Georgetown College held the school's 216th Commencement exercises on Saturday, May 10 with President William H. Crouch presiding. Assisting President Crouch in the conferring of degrees on 247 graduates was Dr. William F. Pollard, Provost/Dean of the College.

Rockcastle County High School graduate, John Andrew Hale, graduated *Summa Cum Laude*, receiving a Bachelor of Science degree as a Mathematics major with Religion and Psychology minors. Hale was also recognized for his outstanding academic honors while a student at Georgetown.

"During the college's annual Academic Honors Day for the Class of 2003, Hale received the Outstanding Major in Mathematics Award, the Outstanding Student in New Testament Greek Award, and the Alpha Lambda Delta Book Award for maintaining a 4.0 grade point average during his four years at Georgetown. He was also recognized as a member of Phi Kappa Phi, Alpha Lambda Delta and Omicron Delta Kappa Academic Honor Societies, Who's Who in American Colleges, as a Dean's Ambassador and a Brown Scholar.

While at Georgetown, Andy was actively involved in the Baptist Student Union, serving on three mission teams, on the BSU Fellowship Committee and as a Freshman Family Group leader. He was a member of the Chapel Ministry Leadership Team as well as serving on the Governing Board of the Association of Georgetown Students. As a varsity football player and a two-year letterman, Hale played on four Mid-South Conference Championship teams, four NAIA National Football Finalist teams and two NAIA National Football Championship Teams from 1999 to 2002, compiling a four-year record of 35 wins against only 3 losses. He was named a 2000, 2001

and 2002 Mid South Scholar Athlete, a 2001 and 2002 NAIA Academic All-American Football Scholar Athlete and to the 2002 Verizon Academic All-District Team. Besides serving as the team's Chaplain, Hale also was this year's recipient of the Bob Hinton Coaches' Award for the Outstanding Student Athlete.

Andy has been accepted to the Masters of Divinity in Missouri, Evangelism, and Church Growth program at the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville. He is the son of John and Nancy Hale of Mt. Vernon and is married to the former Christy Garland of Louisville.

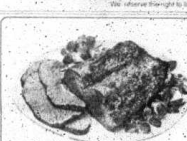

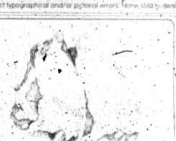
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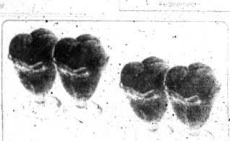
