several types of these simple plugs. They are inexperisive, easy to use
and disposable.

Custom ear molds are specially fitted for a person by an audiologist and work well to decrease the intensity of sound. They are most useful

and work well to decrease the intensity of sound. They are most useful for low frequency noise. Inexpensive, moldable wax can be used in younger children and infants.

Earmuffs cover the whole ear and are very protective, especially for high frequency noise. They are used around airplane traffic, chainsaws, and other machinery. Ear plugs and earmuffs used together give maximum protection.


