Assessing 2003 Precipitation -How wet has it been?

Most Essient Kentucky residents would not argue the fact that 2003 has been a wet year. Heavy rain in February resulted in widespread fooding across the Kentucky coal fields, with locations in the Kentucky River Basin seeing flood creasts the highest they, d been sinte the 80x. Soil onditions remained wet for much of the first few months of the year, hindering farmers in the planting of crops. 2003 into the record books as the eighth wettest year since records were began at the Julian Carroll Airport, in 1981.

Actual rainfall, during the remaining months of this year could be greater or less, depending on the location and persistence of large scale atmospheric patterns that establish over the hemisphere and around the globe. Scientists have discovered that cover the less of the les

Niña or El Niño in the next few months.

One, other factor to consider though is tropical storms. Fall is on the tail end of the tropical storm sea-son, however, storms have developed in the past in September and Octo-ber and trickled close enough to pro-duce heavy rain over Eastern Ken-tucky.
