From Crusade for Children

Rockcastle Hospital receives additional gift

It may not offer creamy, frozen treats like the local ice cream truck, but a Rockcastle Hospital van is becoming just as well known in some neighborhoods.

"The Kid's Van," which is easily identified by the happy children painted on the side, recently began delivering therapy to young patients' homes.

The van was given to the hospital by the WHAS Crusade for Children. It had been in use by another organization that no longer needed it, so the Crusade started looking for a way to put it back into action.

"We were very surprised and excited when the Crusade director offered us the van," Linda Gregory, director of speech therapy, said, "We

jumped at the opportunity to enhance the delivery of pediatric services by gaining the mobility which the van offers."

Now it is used primarily for home therapy visits conducted by the Rehabilitation Department for approved home health pediatric patients and children.

First Step Patients: First Step is a federally funded program for children up to three years old that allows in-home evaluation and treatment. The van has become a therapy room on wheels and includes a wheelchair lift to ease the entry and exit for many patients. With ample storage space, it has cut down on the time and burden of hospital staff, who now don't have to load heavy equip-

ment in and out of cars between every session.

"Receiving this van has made one of our dreams come true," Gregory said. "Not only is it convenient, but it can provide a quiet, controlled atmosphere that is conducive to good therapy sessions."

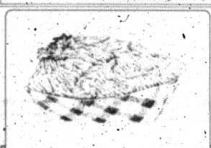
