an attempt to get ideas and input concerning the refurbishing and revitalization of Main Street in Mt. Vernon and the surrounding areas on November 19th. The mayors of Mt. Vernon, Brodhead, and Livingston were also

Brodhead, and Livingston were also injuvited to attend. The group met about 8 a.m. and utilized the RTEC bus for transportation. They traveled to Columbia, Glasgow, and Scottwille, Kentucky, which, was abbut a three hundred-mel round trip. The chief goals were to gather input, negative or positive, in those three towns: revitalization in those three towns: revitalization towns, and to note the growth after their revitalization process to see how towns, and to note the growth after their revitalization process to see how they dealt with the growth. This had to be done before any plans for such development in Rockcastle County could materialize. Some of the similarities these


